

Foster Care First Year Report 2016—2017

Coordinated Care Washington

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On April 1, 2016, Coordinated Care launched the Apple Health Core Connections (AHCC,) an innovative program for Washington State. This unique partnership between the Health Care Authority (HCA), Children's Administration/DSHS (CA), and Coordinated Care, is a single source, statewide managed care contract for nearly all health care services for our state's children in foster care, adoption support and young adult alumni of foster care (up to age 26). AHCC will become a Fully Integrated Managed Care program (FIMC) across Washington State in 2018.

MEMBERSHIP


Our current AHCC membership is approaching 24,000, with kids coming into and leaving the child welfare system at approximately 500 members/month; **The first year overall membership growth was 6%.** Membership increase is attributed to growth in Foster Care/ Out of Home placement members, with the number of Adoption Support members stabilizing.

Through the development of our adolescent2Adult (a2A) programming, Behavioral Health Organizations data sharing and partnerships with Transitioning Age Youth providers, we've seen an increase in Alumni membership (18-26), and in year 2 will continue to focus efforts on enrolling Alumni so they can benefit from services and support designed for their young adult needs.

CLAIMS & NETWORK

The extension of our 'Continuity of Care' program has resulted in seamless claims payments to providers.

Between April 1, 2016 and April 1, 2017, Coordinated Care **paid over 364,000 pharmacy, behavioral and physical health claims, totaling \$50 million in payments.** 99% of AHCC claims were paid within 30 days, with an average payment timeframe of 10 days.

CALL CENTER

Our dedicated Apple Health Core Connections call center, which answers questions from members, families, caregivers, and provider organizations, has fielded over **16,000 calls from members** since Go-Live, with an average speed to answer (ASA) of **14 seconds** and Average Handle Time of 12 minutes.

HEALTH CARE COORDINATION TEAM

AHCC maintains over 50 dedicated employees in a fully-integrated physical and behavioral health team including Social Workers, Specialized Behavioral Health Clinicians, Nurses, AHCC Liaisons, Program Specialists and Customer Service Representatives across our Seattle, Tacoma and Yakima ofjces, with a team additionally based in Spokane. **AHCC's extensive outreach campaign has identified over 3,000** members to share the program's benefits.

Since April 2016, our Integrated Care Management teams have logged over **22,000 contacts with members, caregivers providers and social workers**. Almost 500 members are currently enrolled in ongoing Intensive Care Management.

COMMUNITY EDUCATION

Since 2016, our Community Education Team has delivered over 450 trainings, educating more than 6,000 stakeholders including foster parents, caregivers, parent allies, social workers, behavioral and physical health providers statewide;

AHCC Liaisons responded to over **900 requests** for assistance and logged over **90 visits to Children's Administration offices since 2016,** and CA Social Workers are able to resolve systemic issues quickly as Liaisons are the conduits between Coordinated Care, Child Welfare and Providers.

SPECIALIZED PROGRAMS

Care Grants launched in 2017 to provide funds (up to \$100) for non-Medicaid services such as art supplies, sports equipment and classes to encourage healthy and prosocial behaviors.

Zero Suicide & Emergency Department (ED) Diversion AHCC uses Suicide Prevention Protocol, Columbia Suicide Risk Assessment (CSRA) and Crisis Response Planning and works closely with BH/ PH providers to support their work, as foster kids are nearly three times more prone to suicidal ideation. ED Diversion and Suicide Prevention Protocol with robust follow-up and monitoring has initially demonstrated a **59% reduction in ED visits**.

Adolescent 2 Adult (a2A) specialized outreach campaign to engage adolescents in their healthcare starting at 18 years of age, linkage to "aging out" adolescent and young adult specific resources statewide and based on youth needs, enrollment in a2A Care Management pathway with ongoing community-based follow-up.

"We Care" (starting Q2 2017): Youth Homeless Shelter program, co-locating health care coordination team members at youth shelters to engage youth/alumni in AHCC and a2A programming.

Over 13,250 Early Periodic Screening Diagnosis and Treatment (EPSDT)/Well Child Visits completed.

LOOKING AHEAD

Coordinated Care has launched its approach for statewide **Fully Integrated ManagedCare(FIMC) for Foster Care in 2018**, integrating with our efforts for regional reprocurement. Our planning includes a continuum of services bringing together key providers for a successful and collaborative implementation. Coordinated Care is executing contracts with key child-serving residential, SUD outpatient, psychiatric inpatient and E&T providers across Washington.

We are deploying additional community education and provider-specific programming to support delivery system practice transformation and support FIMC efforts across AHCC populations.

AHCC participates in regional **Family Youth and System Partner Round Tables (FYSPRTs)** to understand the needs of the community, and elicit family and youth voice as we shape the system of care model.



Coordinated Care cherishes our partnerships with Health Care Authority, Children's Administration/ DSHS, legislative and community partners and devoted families to provide holistic health care services for our state's foster and adoptive youth.
