

2022 Community Impact Report

Coordinated Care is committed to transforming the health of the community one person at a time through affordable healthcare coverage, whole person health and reinvesting in partners and communities across Washington.

As a local managed care organization, our community giving program focuses on ways to influence health and wellness beyond a visit to the doctor. This includes food insecurity, access to care, equity, and other social determinants of health. We partner with organizations who know their local neighborhoods and how best to serve the needs of our communities.

Since 2020, Coordinated Care has **invested \$6 million with more than 200 community partners and projects.** This report highlights some of our collective impact from 2022.

2022 Overview





Coordinated Care works to address health inequities impacting BIPOC, LGBTQ+ and other underrepresented populations. We value the insights of organizations serving these populations, so we can create sustainable solutions for individuals and for Washington. Some of the projects funded in 2022 include:



Parenting and maternal health support for Tacoma Urban League, Connect Casino Road, FIRST Legal Clinic and Adopted Life.



Bilingual and culturally relevant healthcare services with La Casa Hogar, Tahoma Indian Center, Yakima Valley Farm Workers, Seattle Indian Health Board and Native Project.



Empowering at-risk youth and young adults to become proactive leaders and build careers with Northwest Credible Messenger, Pro Se Potential, O.U.R. Journey and Native American Reentry Services.



Mental health awareness sessions in multiple languages, with bilingual mental health therapists, for Asia Pacific Cultural Center.



Reinforcing positive and **connective experiences for kids in foster care** with partners such as Cocoon House, Embrace Washington, The Mockingbird Society and Sibling Strong.



LGBTQ+ outreach programs with Center for Children and Youth Justice and Spectrum Center of Spokane.



Coordinated Care staff joins Sibling Strong summer camp for kids in foster care to reunite with siblings.





The demand for healthcare professionals continues to be an issue across the country. Coordinated Care recognizes the need to build up our local Washington healthcare workforce, which continues to be a focus of our investment work.

To cultivate and support careers in healthcare, we **expanded our Coordinated Care Community Scholarship program by 400% in 2022 with partners statewide**, for first-generation and BIPOC individuals pursuing healthcare professions.



200+ students

received funds for tuition and emergency funds for rent, childcare, and transportation.



Coordinated Care consulted experts across the state to finance:



Recruiting, retention and training support for behavioral health workers across the state with 12 partner organizations.



900 blood pressure cuffs for low-income, at-risk individuals across the state.



A **medication dispensing machine** at the Seattle Downtown Emergency Service Center (DESC).



First 5 Fundamentals' Family Connects program to **expand postpartum nurse support,** so more families receive help.



Access to the **suicide prevention program,** Talk Saves Lives[™], provided by the Washington State Chapter of the American Foundation for Suicide Prevention.



Expanding the Maddie's Place facility in Spokane to support infants with neonatal addiction services and their mothers.



Coordinated Care donated baby formula to Maddie's Place in 2022 during the national infant formula shortage.

Social Determinants of Health



Social Determinants of Health (SDoH) are the conditions in the environments where people are born, live, learn, work, play, and age, that affect a wide range of health, functioning, and quality-of-life outcomes and risks. They can seem like common, every day basics but are critical factors impacting health and wellbeing.

Coordinated Care invested over \$1 million in 2022 to support initiatives addressing food insecurity, education, transportation and housing needs.
